A Summer of Hope

After a year of challenges and cancelled events, Summer 2021 provided us with new opportunities to engage with young people in our local area. With the usual trip to Kingcross (KX1) cancelled once again this year, the summer was looking bleak.

However, with restrictions being eased slightly we were able to do some new and exciting things. As well as the opportunities to run these new events, the Trust was extremely grateful for the funding we received from South Lanarkshire Council This enabled us to provide excellent events at no or little cost to the young people and their families.

The first of these events was Holidays Unleashed, this replaced KX1 this year. As well as having funding for these events, the fact that they took place in Cambuslang meant we were able to target more local young people to attend - particularly young people that might not have attended in the past. 35 young people were part of the week long event, taking part in activities including archery-tag and pond-dipping. In addition to taking part in these

exciting activities and engaging with their local environment in fresh and new ways (including a walk up Dechmont Hill), we had lots of opportunities to chat while exploring the Bible together. Over the week we looked at the Book of Ruth and how her



story signposts us to Jesus. All the young people and team had a fantastic week which was helped by the amazing weather. Having never done this type of event before we weren't sure what to expect but it worked far better than we could have hoped for.

There is lots to give thanks to God for and lots of food for thought for future years.

In the last few years we have worked in partnership with local churches in Cambuslang to provide a holiday club type of event for teenagers. Last year this was unable to happen for obvious reasons but this year, thanks once again to South Lanarkshire Council, we were able to do something a little bit



more exciting for our young people. At the end of such a challenging year it was incredible to be able to take some local young people out for a couple of days to explore some of Scotland's beauty and spend quality time together doing lots of activities. This included a trip to Millport where we did some kayaking and had lunch together before returning to Largs for ice-cream, putting and dinner.

On our second day we visited Chatelherault Park where the young people participated in a scavenger hunt before lunch. We then travelled through to Hamilton where we went to the cinema and had dinner together. It was great to be able to offer the young people these events free of charge particularly after the year we have all experienced. After the excitement of Holidays Unleashed and our teenage day trips it was time for something a little more familiar: Holiday Clubs.

Thanks to the extra funding we were able to do significantly more including exciting crafts, props


and good quality snacks. Restrictions meant that we still had to do things a little differently, we had smaller teams and less spaces available to young people, but this did not stop everyone having lots of fun. This year our theme was jungle adventures. We took the young people on a journey through our makeshift jungles whilst exploring some of the accounts of Jesus' life. As always, we had a varied programme of singing, storytelling, games, crafts, and crazy challenges. 2021 started in a way that was difficult for all of us and whilst in the middle of home-schooling and other challenges it might have been hard to see how things could improve.

Thankfully God is a God of hope and we were able to cling to him and look forward expectantly to a time when we could reconnect with people. The summer brought with it warm weather and some renewed freedoms which allowed us to provide quality youth events in our local communities.

These were well received by the young people and their families who were excited about being able to be together again. Our summer programme was able to take place due to the generous funding that we received. It is easy to take this all for granted but it is important to stop and give thanks for what we have received.

Last year in August while halfway through the pandemic we looked forward nervously into the unknown not sure if, or when, things would return to normal. At that time we created a new project to deliver in schools: Boomerang.

This was our fifth project and the main theme is resilience. As well as adapting, some of the ways we have had to change have provided new opportunities which may be worth repeating in the future. One good example of this would be the Holidays Unleashed model which allowed us to engage with local young people in a fresh and exciting way.

At present we are prayerfully considering what our work will look like in the next year or so and this includes what new events we may run over the next year. As we look forward to 2022, we are hopeful that some of our key events like residential weekends and KX1 will be able to return to compliment the work we do throughout the year. 2021 provided lots of challenges but through it all God was faithful in supporting us and providing us with fresh opportunities to serve our local communities, schools and churches. As we look forward to 2022 we do so with hope and expectation that opportunities will come our way which allow us to continue to serve
