As the story of the Bible unfolds we encounter again, and again, significant events that had beginnings that could easily have been overlooked.

Abraham decides to leave his hometown and so unfolds God's incredible plan for his family, David's years looking after sheep in the hills prepare him to be King, Ruth is quietly gleaning in a field when she is noticed by Boaz, Gideon is hiding in a winepress from his enemies when God comes to visit, and some voung men on a beach in Galilee are asked by a rabbi to leave everything and come and follow Him.

Looking back 25 years to the beginnings of the Cambuslang and Rutherglen Reachout

Trust, it was all very simple and apparently insignificant. The Churches in the area were working well together, and I had been doing some full-time volunteering with them for Scripture Union Scotland in the local schools: working alongside school chaplains, leading and supporting SU groups, and holding out of school events for children and young people.

The work was going well and some of us began to chat (conversations are such good things!) about the possibility of employing a local schools' worker in the area. These conversations brought up lots of questions, one of the most important ones being, "How can someone be employed by so many Churches!?". The answer, of course, was to set up a charitable trust which would give independence to the work alongside the existing Christian witness in the community.

Those of us who had those conversations all those years ago just took one step at a time and as we did so the Trust began to take shape: the signing of the trust deeds (which now look like an ancient document), the appointment of our first worker (the wonderful Fiona Stewart!). and working out what a Christian schools' worker could and should do.

We were the very first Trust of this kind in Scotland, and the model has now been copied across our nation enabling thousands of children and young people to hear about Jesus. Jesus said, "What shall we say the Kingdom of God is like...it is like a mustard seed, which is the smallest of all seeds on earth. Yet when planted, it grows and becomes the largest of all garden plants, with such big branches that the birds can perch in its shade." Mark 4:30-32 This has been shown to be true in the work of the trust

From its beginnings in a conversation in an ordinary town with very ordinary people it has grown and branched out, and many have found the safety that only Christ can bring. What is the challenge for us now, in this time and place? What are the conversations we need to be having that will lead us on to the next step of the work God is calling us to?
