For the last 12 years I have worked in partnership with local ministers to support schools and provide young people opportunities to reflect and consider what life is all about. This year has been very different. We haven't been in any schools since March 16th. At times this year has been tough for all of us. Schools being closed meant we were all put on furlough for nearly 4 months. When we eventually came back, we had no Idea what we were going to do as we were still not allowed to go into schools.

Thinking back to my tree, another bible passage from Matthew comes to mind. It talks about not worrying because God (who provides for the Birds and wildflowers) cares for and provides for us. It is hard not to worry when everything around about you has changed so dramatically and you need to totally rethink all that you do. Trusting God seems obvious but sometimes it's easy to miss that he is dependable, unchanging and always provides for our needs. Our way of working has changed but we are still able to support our local schools and provide opportunities for young people to reflect and consider what the Bible has to say about different subjects that are relevant to them.

Yes, life is different, but we have been provided with opportunities that we may not otherwise have had. Our new project Boomerang, has been written, filmed and used by many of the primary schools. We are providing two video assemblies a month to every primary school in the area. We have also manged to take part in a class discussion and deliver our Buddy project Google Meet with one class and are hoping to do another in December.

This year there will be no early starts for Christmas unwrapped or trying hard not to laugh as Kirsten or David go off script as the Nutty Professor. However, the work goes on. God remains faithful and thanks to technology we are still able to support local schools and provide opportunities for young people to stop and reflect. As this year draws to a close and we look forward with hope to 2021, let us not look back and remember all the challenges or difficulties but reflect with a smile on the blessings and new opportunities that have been given to us.

As I finish let me take this opportunity to wish you and your family a wonderful Christmas and a blessed New year.

Kenny McKie worked for Scripture Union Scotland for 43 years. In many roles over the last 10 years he has served as the west team leader as well as a regional worker. Part of Kenny's job was to support volunteers and staff, but his main passion was schools work and residentials.

He was Ross's line manager and the SU link to the trust for the last 4 years before he retired in August. Let's take a moment to find out a little more about him and his plans for retirement.

(Briefly) Tell us a little about your family.

Alison is my wife of 42 years, and we have 4 children: Stuart, Gordon, Laura and Karen and 3 grandchildren. All live within 10 miles of us.

Apart from church and the Bible what are you passionate about?

I'm passionate about sharing the gospel with children and young people – I believe my calling was to be a young peoples evangelist and discipler.

You will no doubt have many highlights from your 43 years in ministry, could you please share one or two?

I've led many camps over the years, but a highlight has been leading one at Kingscross since 1978 and seeing many young people own their own faith and going on to be significant Christians in the church worldwide. Another highlight were Christian Focus weeks in schools around the country with Rod and Marco and John Mackinnon – they allowed us to reach the whole secondary school with the Good News through drama and song and class work.

How have you seen God at work?

God has changed many young lives over the years, and it's been a privilege to be part of that. God has spoken through many volunteers at camps and in school groups, including some of my own family. He has moved to rescue many thousands of children and young people through our camps and schools work as we opened up the Bible to them. God has rescued these young people to eternal life and transformed them. In the words of a young person who was tragically killed as he embarked on a year of full time service "He alone can rescue, He alone can save".

What will you miss most?

Working with colleagues and large teams of volunteers and visiting many SU groups and volunteers to encourage them to follow Christ.

What are your plans for your retirement?

Caravanning all over the UK and visiting friends when we're allowed. We have time to meet with loads of friends we've made through SU over the years. Active in our church at The Tron, Kelvingrove. What is your prayer for SU and Reachout in these difficult times?

Stay faithful to the Gospel and to reach young people with the Good News. Along with Paul to the Ephesians in chapter 3:

"For this reason I bow my knees before the Father, from whom every family in heaven and on earth is named, that according to the riches of his glory he may grant you **to be strengthened with power through his Spirit in your inner being**, so that Christ may dwell in your hearts through faith that you, being rooted and grounded in love, may have strength to comprehend with all the saints what is the breadth and length and height and depth, and to know the love of Christ that surpasses knowledge, that you may be filled with all the fullness of God.

Now to him who is able to do far more abundantly than all that we ask or think, according to the power at work within us, to him be glory in the church **and in Reachout** and in Christ Jesus throughout all generations, forever and ever. Amen."

It's all change; but things remains the same

One of the most striking aspects of life at present is the difficulty in making plans: whether it is plans for seeing family or friends, plans for church services, plans for holidays, plans for just going somewhere. We make plans the one day and by the next day or the next week the guidance around the Covid-19 restrictions changes and we have to change our plans. What we took for granted last year has certainly not been our experience this year.

This is no bad thing. James in his letter speaks about making the assumption that we know what tomorrow brings and corrects it by saying that we ought to say "if the Lord wills it, we will live and do this or do that".

So, with this constant change it has felt very much like a time of new beginnings for Reachout as we have had to learn new ways of doing the work. It has meant planning differently (yes, that still has to happen!) because, instead of arriving at a school on the day with all the materials for a particular project to be delivered to a class or an assembly, everything has to be prepared in advance. The talks have to be videoed and edited; the bags of accompanying materials have to be made up and delivered in advance in a safe way; and the instructions have to be emailed to the school. What then happens is beyond the control of Ross and Alison - they have to trust that the schools will be effective in the presentation of the project.

We have had some amazing responses from the schools who have been very appreciative of the materials which have been produced and the support which Ross and Alison have been able to give them. Even so, doing "Christmas Unwrapped" is going to be very different this year because Ross and Alison and many volunteers will not be in the schools and able to interact with the children. I, for one, will miss that!

In the midst of all this change, many things remain the same, most of all the good news of Jesus. We are thankful that the work of Reachout to make the good news of Jesus known in the schools has continued, and perhaps been more demonstrably acknowledged than previously. God's faithfulness remains the same and he has blessed the work over these recent months. The need for young folk to hear the gospel hasn't changed – and it is probably greater than ever in these uncertain times.

On a practical level the need for funding hasn't changed. Our Vision 20:20 fundraising project (see the back page) lost traction because of everything coming to a standstill at the end of March. We would be hugely grateful if some reading this felt able to respond to that project by giving for the first time or by increasing their giving in our current financial year.


Vision 20:20 fundraising project
